Dear Parents,

I want to share with you a card we received in the post on Wednesday regarding the children's conduct and behaviour at Mass:

Attendance

Some families may have received a letter regarding attendance in the post this week. This is part of a whole school address and initiative to improve attendance. Obviously, illness happens and COVID is responsible for higher levels of absence than normal. However, the fact remains that there are 190 days that children attend school across the year and every single lesson is important: each lesson is an essential part of the learning process. If a child's attendance were to drop to 95%, that is equivalent to 9 days of lost learning.

We have employed an Education Welfare Officer to emphasise how serious we are about addressing persistent low attendance. It is also important to arrive at school on time. If a child arrives late to school every day, their learning begins to suffer.

<u>Uniform</u>

In September, we are rolling out a new school jumper with an embroidered badge. This should emphasise the pride that children take in wearing their school uniform when representing St Ambrose Barlow. In addition to this, there will be a new school tie with our new school badge on. The designs are still being finalised but there is likely to be a KS1 tie (a clip on tie of a standard length) and a KS2 tie that will need to be tied in the standard manner. As I said to the children, they have five months now to learn to tie one independently - this is NOT a job for parents and is not intended to be an added stress in the mornings. As ever, I welcome feedback on which format would be preferable. The old uniform (plain grey jumpers and ties) can still be worn as we gradually use the old stock and phase it out. I am aware of the cost of uniform and obviously there will be measures in place to address this.

Reading at St Ambrose Barlow

Yesterday, Year One to Six took part in a theatre workshop, based around Shakespeare's *Á Midsummer Night's Dream.* It was a hugely successful day and will form part of their written Literacy work next week. Every child enjoyed it and lots could talk about the favourite characters afterwards.

Year One has voted that *The Finger Eater* by Dick King-Smith will be their next class reader. They will start it on Monday. Alongside *Charlie and The Great Glass Elevator*, Year Two are reading *The*

Hodgeheg by Dick King-Smith, as they'll be using this story to write a nonchronological report in their Literacy lessons. Year Five are now reading *The Christmas Pig* by JK Rowling. They enjoyed The Silver Sword: the overall consensus was that it was a good book but the vocabulary was slightly dated by our standards. Roy and Joy, both in Year One, have just finished *Kitchen Disco* by Clare Foges and next week they will start *Paddington's Easter Egg Hunt* by Michael Bond. Mrs Haughton, who supports Roy and Joy, is reading *Rainy Days for the Harper Girls* by Rosie Clarke.

Miss Atkins is reading *Run, Rose, Run* by Dolly Parton and James Patterson which she is enjoying! It's currently on the front seat of her car for whenever she needs it. Miss Traynor is reading *The Return* by Victoria Hislop and Mr Clinton is reading *The Midnight Library* by Matt Haig, which he picked up in the staffroom from our book corner, leaving a copy of *The Book Thief* by Markus Zusak.

We wave goodbye to our Year Six class on Monday as they spend four nights at Boreatton, taking part in all manner of team-building activities (canoeing, kayaking, abseiling, archery, climbing, orienteering).
