Dear Parents,

John Hall, the Chair of our Governing Body, wrote to you all yesterday to confirm the appointment of Mrs Bresnen as the substantive Deputy Headteacher, having occupied the position in an interim capacity since October. I wish to add my congratulations and echo the sentiment that Mr Hall expressed: the school is making changes to improve the Quality of Catholic Education and Personal Development that we offer the children - the appointment of a strong Senior Leadership Team is part of this. We were blessed with many applicants, of whom three were shortlisted, and I know Mrs Bresnen will work to the best of her undoubted ability to make St Ambrose Barlow Catholic Primary School all it can be.

We have ended the Spring term on a high note. Every morning during Lent, we have had a daily Walk With Me assembly led by a staff member. Every day during Holy Week, a KS2 class has led us in a reflection based upon Jesus's final week before his crucifixion - Palm Sunday, the Last Supper, the arrest of Jesus and, finally, Stations of the Cross. This afternoon, we have had our celebration assembly, climaxing with our Easter Egg raffle being drawn and every child receiving a small Easter treat.

Reading at St Ambrose Barlow

I cannot emphasize how highly reading features in our School Development Plan in our quest to make sure our pupils have all the experience, knowledge, and confidence they need to succeed in life – no matter what this vocation may be. If any parents or grandparents wish to volunteer their time, please do so! We are more than happy to encourage this!

Phonics features daily for Reception, Year One and Year Two. Reception and Year One also have Reading Practice sessions that occur three times a week where EVERY child is heard in a group with a member of staff. Each session has a different focus: decoding, reading with prosody, and comprehension. Reading Practice continues into Year Two and KS2 in a slightly different format, where children either read independently or with an adult

Additionally, we have class libraries, a school library, and plans for all children in Year Two and above to visit Hall Green library. We have a daily class reader that is read to the children in class every day. We also use high quality literature in lessons – not just Literacy but in foundation subjects too. Our provision currently is not perfect but neither have we finished improving our approach. Parents, I know you support the school in a great many ways already, but please make the time and the effort to read daily with and to your children, and to hear them read also. At school, it is our number one priority and this is shown by the time we dedicate to reading. It is also apparent in *how* we hear children read: we sit at a desk, on a chair; we sit with the book in front of us and hold it appropriately; and the staff give the children their total attention. These are behaviour and habits that emphasize how much we value reading. Please ask your child what the class reader is; ask them to

summarise the plot. Supplement it with reading the same text at home. If your child is in KS2, you can even give them their own copy that they can bring to school.

Year Two were three chapters from the end of *Charlie and the Great Glass Elevator* on Wednesday morning, hoping to finish the book before they broke up for Easter! Lauren Dewell is reading *Wind in the Willows*. She said she is looking forward to reading over the Easter holidays. Oisin Finnegan is reading *Diary of the Wimpy Kid: The Meltdown*. He told me that he is really enjoying it and is taking it on holiday to Ireland over Easter. Annie Stephenson is reading *Four Kids and It*. She has only just started it but says so far that it is both mysterious and magical. All three of the children above are in Miss Atkin's Year Five class, where regular discussions happen about reading. Miss Atkins herself has three books to read over Easter and Mrs Drewry currently is reading two books at the same time!

I hope to get time to start a new book that was recommended to me: *A Gentleman in Moscow*. I will let you know how I get on.
