CAFOD 'Live Simply'



You will soon be able to see a copy of our action plan on the school website underneath Catholic life. As you may be aware, we are tasked with undertaking nine actions: three in school, three in the local community, and three with a global impact (though, of course, there is some overlap). These are outlined here:

#1 Support schools in Rwanda with fundraising and/or material needs, including asking if they desire pen pals!
#2 Become a School of Sanctuary to highlight the plight of refuges in Birmingham and look for ways to actively support them

#3 Visit St Chad's Sanctuary to find how we, as a school, can best support asylum seekers in our local community.

#4 Litter picking in the local area on a rota basis.

#5 Attending the Friday Dementia Café in the parish hall on a rolling rota basis.

#6 Raising money for the homeless and supporting St Basil's charity.

#7 Reducing our electricity usage by turning off lights when we leave the room and having a morning without using an electricity at all to experience what life is like for others less fortunate.

#8 Recycling more, wasting less: re-using and reducing. We also aim to use less sheets in school and photocopy materials far less frequently.

#9 Underpinning what we teach in the National Curriculum with Catholic Social Teaching: we are all called to holiness and asked to build God's kingdom here on Earth.

Currently reading...

Year Two are devouring books. They are currently reading Wiggles Bottom Primary: The



Toilet Ghost by Becka Moor. Their previous class readers so far this year include The Chocolate Monster by Jan Page, The Wizard and Me: More misadventures of Bubbles the Guinea Pig by Simon Farnaby and The Finger-Eater by Dick King-Smith. In a pleasing example of progression, Year Two have just finished The Hodgeheg by Dick King-Smith

Year Five have finished *Beowulf* by Michael Morpurgo and are now reading a different version of Beowulf – they are enjoying comparing the two different texts and seeing how different authors and illustrators have adapted the original Beowulf poem.

Year Three have enjoyed reading *The Owl Who Was Afraid Of The Dark* and now they are continuing the Roald Dahl theme started in Year Two by reading *George's Marvellous Medicine*. They are reading them in both whole-class Guided Reading sessions and also their class reader slots.

Year Six have just finished *War Horse* and have just started *Pig Heart Boy*. They tell me that also have *Farm Boy* (the sequel to War Horse) lined up as a 'must-read'.

Mr Clinton is reading *One More Croissant for the Road*, a culinary trip around France on two wheels written by Felicity Cloake. Three of my favourite things rolled into one book: France, cycling and eating!
