Strike action

As you may have seen in the media, teachers who belong to the NASUWT, NAHT and NEU teaching unions were balloted before Christmas. The results were announced earlier this week, with both the NASUWT and NAHT failing to reach the 50% turnout that the law requires for them to achieve in order to strike. However, the NEU achieved this threshold and of those that voted, 90.4% were in favour of strike action.

I am not yet in a position to say how this will affect St Ambrose Barlow. I will follow advice from the DfE and my own teaching union. We have teachers in the NEU and they have a democratic right to strike. What I will say is that no teacher wants to strike – legally, a teacher can only strike over their pay and conditions but, in doing so, they are sending a wider statement about the chronic state of school funding as a whole.

When I can share more information, I will do so. I wish to forewarn you that the possibility of closure on 1st February is a last resort but still very real.

THE GOSPEL IN CHURCH Sunday 22nd January 2023

Dear Parents and Guardians,

Since the introduction of Universal Infant Free School Meals (i.e. every child in Reception and KS1 having a free meal), fewer parents are carrying out the necessary checks to see if the are eligible for further funding.

This means our number for Pupil premium (the extra funding that government gives the school) are low, severely affecting our budget. For every successful application, the school gains an additional £1,450 per year. As a school, we rely heavily on this extra funding to pursue activities for the children, such as:

- Provide targeted additional adult support in every classroom.
- Provide financial support so that children can attend day and residential trips.
- Employ an intervention Support Teaching Assistant to provide support for children who are at risk of not making progress.

Even if you were eligible for free school meals at only one point, your child gets this funding every year. That could be an extra £10,000 over the course of your child's life here at school. If three families were to be eligible, that is the cost of a new teaching assistant.

Please access the online portal via https://www.cloudforedu.org.uk/ofsm/birmingham/.

The process takes a few minutes only and you will receive email confirmation of your application and the decision based on your personal circumstances – the data is completely private and once you have applied regular checks are run by the council in case your circumstances change.

The children will never find out if they are on FSM nor does their class teachers. It would be kept private. You may have applied in the past and not been eligible; however, since the pandemic, many family situations have changed and therefore I urge you again to apply.

If you need any assistance with the application, please contact the school office in complete confidence.

In this Sunday's Gospel, we hear about Jesus starting to gather together the first Christian community.


Christian communities (just like families) are never perfect – even Jesus' closest disciples weren't always the ideal set of people. However, everyone works better with others in community.
