THE GOSPEL IN CHURCH Sunday 14th May 2023



Jesus said to the disciples, "If you love me you will keep my commandments. I shall ask the Father, and he will give you a Helper to be with you forever. He will give you the Spirit of Truth. The world neither sees nor knows the Spirit, but you

know the Spirit, because the Spirit is with you, and lives in you. I will not leave you orphaned: I will come back to you. In a short time the world will no longer see me but you will still see me. Then you will know that I am in my Father, and you are in me, and I am in you. Those who receive my commandments and keep them are those who love me. Those who love me will be loved by my Father. I will love them, and they will see me as I truly am."

John's Gospel above alludes to the Ascension, which we will celebrate this coming Thursday with a Whole School Mass. All parents are welcome to attend! As Father Paul mentions in his bulletin, it is a Holy Day of Obligation and, as such, there will be a Mass at 7pm for those parents who can not attend the school Mass.
