Et Tandem... Thirst



Because of thirst, I accidentally ate bird poo once. In my defence, I was little and very thirsty as I ran out onto the playground at morning break. I had nothing to drink. The climbing frame was glistening with morning dew, little droplets just hanging there, and so I ran my tongue along the bar to drink them up. I didn't notice the 'streak' on the bar until I tasted something ... let's just say, chalky, and not water.

That was not as embarrassing as when I was thirsty when shopping with Dad. The large supermarket chest freezers had ice crystals on the metal trim inside. So, with no one watching, I stuck my tongue out to collect the ice. Big mistake. My tongue instantly froze onto the metal. Bent over the frozen chickens, on tiptoes and flapping my arms, I gurgled for help.

Thirst can be a strong motivating force of our movements and thoughts in the hunt to quench it.

But the strongest thirst happened during lockdown when the churches were closed. Something more than water was denied to us. So I was compelled to drive to the nearest church that had a window on the locked doors, just so I could see the tabernacle. Because sometimes, like water, we don't realise how life giving something is until we don't have it – or until it is taken away from us.
