#### **Key Stage Two Outcomes**

On Tuesday, the school received notification of our Key Stage outcomes. On the same day, I communicated these to the Diocese and to the Governors. I have copied them for you below and they will soon appear on our website.

**KS2 Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar:** 90% at Expected standard (72% National average) and 43% achieving Greater Depth.

**KS2 Writing:** 83% at Expected standard (71% National average) and 23% Greater Depth

**KS2 Maths:** 90% at Expected standard (73% National average) and 37% Greater Depth

**KS2 Reading:** 93% at Expected standard (73% National average) and 73% at Greater Depth

83% of our children received Expected in Reading, Writing and Maths combined (compared to 59% National average)
The average score out of 25 for our Year Four children for the Multiplication check was 22/25, which just shows the importance of Times Table Rock Stars in my opinion!

I am especially proud of the reading results. The percentage for children working at Greater Depth is equivalent of the national average of children working at the Expected standard. This shows, to my mind at least, that our huge focus on reading that the school has had for the past two years has really paid off. Every single pound spent on new texts and every minute spent walking to the local library has paid off, and will hopefully continue to do so.

I am sure you will join me in thanking all our hard-working staff for these wonderful results. They are, after all, the product of many years of hard work, but I especially want to thank Miss Newman and Mrs Drewry for all their efforts these past 12 months.

#### **Sports Day**

Aside from a panicked weekend after torrential rain, I hope you agree with me that this was a great success. Perhaps not perfect and definitely room for some modifications, but it remained a real celebration of sporting prowess, of teamwork, and of unconditional support. 


# Our Special Time Together

"Good communication helps us to grow closer. It is so important to listen."


