THE GOSPEL IN CHURCH Sunday 3rd December 2023



Jesus said to his disciples, "Be on your guard, stay awake, because you do not know when the end time will come. It is like a man travelling abroad; he leaves his house and puts

his servants in charge, each with his own task, and orders the doorkeeper to stay awake. So, stay awake - because you do not know when the Master of the house is coming; it may be evening or midnight, cockcrow or dawn. If he comes unexpectedly, he may find you still sleeping. What I am saying to you now, I say to everyone: Stay awake!"

The message from the Gospel is very clear: we are to 'stay awake' – in doing so, we can pause and reflect on the real reason and true meaning of Christmas and give thanks for God for the gift of Jesus in our world.

Why not buy an extra present?

There is a famous Christmas song, 'Why Not Buy An Extra Present?' with the message that there will be some at

Christmas with nothing. We know that Father Paul and the parish take this very literally, with the Jesse Tree in church, whereby people take a gift tag to buy a present for a family less fortunate.

Here at school, we are doing the opposite: children will, in the coming weeks, write you a letter to ask you to buy one *less* present. The children mean this quite literally: the intention behind this is the money that you will save can be anonymously donated, in a sealed envelope so nobody knows who the envelope has come from, containing as much or as little as you want. The Mini-Vinnies will count this money and donate it to Brushstrokes, where it will pay for Christmas dinner for the needy families and deprived people of Birmingham.

Our staff are leading by example: this year, our Secret Santa has a five-pound limit. The idea is that whatever is saved on not spending more is also donated to charity – again, in a sealed anonymous envelope so nobody knows how much or who from. This will go to the same worthy cause.

PTA Disco

Both afternoon events were amazing —DJ Dave really set the mood with his lights and his music. Behaviour from the children, as you would expect, was exemplary, and everything was wonderfully organised by our PTA committee and parent volunteers. I think I may have even caught some of the adults throwing a few shapes themselves! Honestly, my thanks to all involved.

The discos themselves raised £610 which **ALL** goes towards our fundraising efforts – the snacks and the DJ were paid for by kind donations from parents and local businesses who support our school so the dream of a minibus might yet become a reality.

Parish Christmas Fair

This is all booked in for Saturday 16th December, complete with Santa's grotto, various stalls, cake and hot drinks, and a bottle tombola. We have organised an own clothes day for all children (and staff) for Wednesday 13th December, in exchange for a bottle (preferably alcoholic).

This was a great success: we travelled to the centre of Birmingham by train (itself quite a treat) and then spent the day at Birmingham's Catholic cathedral, learning about its history and its purpose. We then celebrated Mass, visited the piety stall, and ate our lunch in the crypt. Best of all, in my opinion, were the compliments the class received on their behaviour – both at the cathedral itself and also on public transport.
