Wednesday Word

Please find attached the Wednesday Word for the whole of the Christmas break, containing the Gospel for the next four Sundays.

Below is the Gospel for this Sunday, which is *Gaudete* Sunday. The witness of John the Baptist gave people a sense that something exciting was about to happen. Now the focus of Advent shifts from preparing for the second coming of Jesus, to looking at the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem, two thousand years ago.

Gospel

John 1:6-8,19-28

'There stands among you the one coming after me'

A man came, sent by God. His name was John. He came as a witness, as a witness to speak for the light, so that everyone might believe through him. He was not the light, only a witness to speak for the light.

This is how John appeared as a witness. When the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?' he not only declared, but he declared quite openly, 'I am not the Christ.' 'Well then,' they asked 'are you Elijah?' 'I am not' he said. 'Are you the Prophet?' He answered, 'No.' So they said to him, 'Who are you? We must take back an answer to those who sent us. What have you to say about yourself?' So John said, 'I am, as Isaiah prophesied:

a voice that cries in the wilderness: Make a straight way for the Lord.'

Now these men had been sent by the Pharisees, and they put this further question to him, 'Why are you baptising if you are not the Christ, and not Elijah, and not the prophet?' John replied, 'I baptise with water; but there stands among you – unknown to you – the one who is coming after me; and I am not fit to undo his sandal-strap.' This happened at Bethany, on the far side of the Jordan, where John was baptising.

It is also Bambinelli Sunday, which was first instituted by St. John Paul II. On the Third Sunday of Advent, children are encouraged to bring the baby Jesus (*'bambinelli'*) from each of their Nativity sets to Church, where Father Paul will bless the figures.

A man came who was sent by God. His name was John, John the Baptist. He came as a witness – as a witness to Jesus Christ. Priests were sent from Jerusalem to ask John, "Who are you?" John replied, "I am not the Christ." "Are you the prophet Elijah then – or the Prophet?" they asked. He answered, "No." "So, who are you?" they asked. "What have you to say about yourself?" John replied,

"I am the voice of the one who cries in the wilderness: 'Make the Lord's way straight.'" Finally they asked him, "Why are you baptising if you are not the Christ, nor Elijah, nor the Prophet?" John said, "I baptise with water. But someone is coming soon who is more powerful than I am." This happened at Bethany, on the far side of the River Jordan, where John was baptising.

"Dear young people, if we are close to Jesus, we will have joy in our hearts and a smile on our face." Pope Francis

Who did John the Baptist come to tell the people about? This weekend we celebrate the third Sunday of Advent which is known as 'Gaudete Sunday', and we light the pink candle on our advent wreath. The word 'Gaudete' in Latin means 'Rejoice!'. We joyfully celebrate that Christmas is near - we rejoice that Christ is coming. Ask your child what the word 'joy' means to them. Each of you say who or what makes you feel joyful. When do you feel joyful? When was the last time you brought joy to others and what did you do? God wants us to be filled with joy - Jesus came to make our joy complete. Happiness comes and goes, but the joy that comes from close friendship with Jesus stays forever.

Joy is something we all desire. We don't have to search around for joy: it comes from within. When we follow Jesus by loving God and others, we are filled with joy! A joyful heart is a sign of God's Spirit within us. What can you do to help bring joy to others in this coming week? Perhaps you can: give lots of smiles; give someone a gift; remind someone that they are loved by God; cheerfully do what our parents or teachers ask us to do. In these ways we prepare our hearts to be filled with a joy that lasts long after the Christmas festivities have passed.

What did Mary say just before the Angel Gabriel left? Each year on the last Sunday of Advent, we look to Mary, our heavenly mother. In this Sunday's Gospel, the Angel Gabriel announced God's will, and Mary accepted it and put her trust in God. Ask your child if they know the 'Hail Mary', the prayer based on the Angel Gabriel's greeting in this Sunday's Gospel. Ask your child what else they know about Mary. It may help your child to tell them something you know about Mary, or the Rosary.

Enjoy reading this Sunday's Gospel

What guided the wise men to Jesus? This Sunday the Church celebrates the Feast of the Epiphany. We remember how the wise men from the East were guided to Jesus. Ask your child what the word 'guidance' means to them. Who guides them through life, to make sensible and wise choices? Who or what guides you on your journey through life? The Church exists to help us and provides us with the timeless guidance of the Bible and the 'Catechism of the Catholic Church'. These are manuals for life which can guide us on our journey.
