## THE GOSPEL IN CHURCH Sunday 28th January 2024



Jesus and his followers went as far as Capernaum, and as soon as the sabbath came Jesus went to the synagogue and began to teach. Jesus' teaching made a deep impression on them because, unlike the scribes,

he taught them with authority. While he was teaching, Jesus was interrupted by a very sick man who started to shout wildly and whose body was trembling and shaking. So Jesus paused and healed the sick man in full view of the people. The people were so astonished that they started asking each other what it all meant. "Here is a teaching that is new," they said, "and with authority behind it." And his reputation rapidly spread everywhere, through all the surrounding Galilean countryside.

Year Five will be able to tell you all about this Gospel: they have focused in class on the miracles of Jesus and what they tell us – namely, that Jesus has divine power over all earthly things, which is what allows him to teach with such authority.

#### **Currently reading**

Every time I eat my lunch with the children, they read the badge on my lanyard which says "Ask me what I'm currently reading" and I can finally give a different answer. I have finally finished 'Bournville' by

Jonathan Coe (brilliant, by the way) and have started Sally Rooney's 'Beautiful World, Where are You?' I have updated the poster in the entrance foyer accordingly. As you enter any classroom, the class have decorated the door with what they are reading — either in Literacy lessons, or for whole class reading, or reading for pleasure. At any one time, it is possible that a class might have three different books on the go!

Year Six are reading 'I Am Malala' for both their Literacy focus and whole class reading sessions and Year Three are focusing entirely on Ted Hughes' 'The Iron Man' – one of my favourites!

Year One's Literacy unit is called 'Stories on a theme' and for that, they are reading 'The Tale of Peter Rabbit' by Beatrix Potter as well as 'The Enormous Turnip' by Irene Yates. For pleasure, they are reading, 'Marge in Charge' by Isla Fisher - she of 'Home and Away' fame. Year Four have just had a week reading 'Macavity: the Mystery Cat' by TS Elliot and are moving onto 'The Fib' by George Layton. For pleasure, they are reading 'How to Train a Dragon' by Cressida Cowell and Miss Reynolds is reading 'Weirdo' by Sara Pascoe.

In Reception, they are reading books about dinosaurs for the rest of the term. This week, they are focusing on the book 'Harry And His Bucket Full of Dinosaurs'. They are also loving bringing their own books in!

Year Two's Literacy genre is 'Stories by the same author' and are reading by books by Simon Bartram: 'Dougal's Deep-Sea Diary', 'Bob and the Moon Tree Mystery' and 'Man on The Moon'. Their class reader is 'ESP' by Dick King-Smith and Miss Hookes is reading 'The Housemaid's Secret' by Freida McFadden. Year Five are reading 'This is Not Earth' by Tony Bradbury for their Sci-Fi

unit, and 'Slick' by M.M. Vaughn for their class reader.


