Some time ago, I shared a future wish with the PTA that we have our own minibus here in school – it would help with our attendance at sports events and also enable us to undertake more local visits and trips. It could be used for swimming lesson transport, and also be utilised by other community groups. For a long while, it remained just that: wishful thinking.

The PTA pledged to help support this plan and to fundraise, with proceeds for future Summer Fetes contributing to the amount needed. It was to be a long-term plan involving three or four years of careful budgeting. Incredibly, over Christmas, word reached me that another school were looking to upgrade their minibus fleet and therefore were selling a spare.

It seemed too good to be true, but the stars aligned perfectly and Mrs Bresnen and I went to visit the school and see the minibus. It was in excellent condition and very reasonably priced. The PTA agreed to pledge an amount towards the total cost and Father Paul has also made a very generous offering from parish funds, with school making up the remaining amount.

The plan is this: the school will use the bus for sports and, in the future, swimming; meanwhile, the parish will use it for SVP activities and transport for parishioners. We honestly could not have done it without these two separate bodies – the parent body and the parish community – coming together to support our school and our children. This really is evidence of the Holy Spirit in action.

Punctuality
