This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

Or approach is based on the Model music curriculum, which focuses on singing, listening, composing. Improvising, reading, and performing (including pulse/beat/rhythm and pitch).

The whole school teaches music every Wednesday and the teaching is delivered by a specialist music teacher, who works one day a week. Each class has a regular timetabled slot, at the same time each week, lasting for between 30, 45, or 60 minutes depending on age. As with all subjects, learning is scaffolding to take into consideration ability, starting points, and special educational needs. It is a subjects where all can achieve.



In Year Three, the pupils are taught glockenspiel and in year Four, they are taught the fife and the flute. Pupils in Year Five and Six can elect to continue this tuition at a charge.

Part B: Extra-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

In addition to weekly curriculum Music lessons, children also have the opportunity to take part in whole school singing each week, every Wednesday, during *Songs of* Praise hymn practice. Every month, at least, there is opportunity to perform these hymns at Church during a whole school Mass.

There is a weekly after-school choir club, and the opportunity to undertake keyboard lessons. Both are run by the same teacher and take place each Thursday and Friday respectively. Keyboards are loaned to children if they wish to partake.

Children who undertake music lessons outside of school have their achievements celebrated each week in Fridays Gifts from God assembly.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Weekly

Thirty minute weekly 'Songs of Praise' hymn practice

Termly

Keyboard and choir concert, led by school choir and those pupils learning keyboard Termly flute/fife concert led by children of Year Four (all) and those who elect to continue tuition (Year Five and Six)

Key Stage Two Carol Service

Choir to sing at Community / Dementia Café

In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.
